

HIS fall we begin a new phase in the relationship between the Friends of Elmendorph and the Egbert Benson Historical Society as we jointly complete the final plans and solicit estimates for the completion of the Rosemary Coons Historical Archive Room and Gallery on the second floor of the Inn. Responsibility for the final restoration and furnishing of the rooms will shift to the Historical Society and a joint committee is planning the file cabinets, bookshelves, work tables, computer workstation, lighting fixtures and equipment that will be needed to provide safe and efficient storage and accessibility to the Historical Society's growing collection of Red Hook memorabilia and records.

Fortunately, most Historical Society members are also members of the Friends of Elmendorph and Board members Larry Thetford and Thomas Cordier also serve as Society Trustees. This joint effort will fulfill the dream of the founding members of both organizations and we are confident that our Friends will respond generously to the Society's Fall appeal for specific donations to the project.

In the meantime we will be insulating the second floor walls and ceilings so that the new heating ducts can be activated as needed. The electric service has been roughed in with enough lights and outlets completed to permit us to safely work on the second floor. Our new security system will alert the fire company and designated Board members in case of a fire emergency.

Thanks to all of you, we look forward to a winter of accomplishment!

from the volunteers of Elmendorph Etc. (Thrift Shop)



NATIONAL RECOGNITION AWARD TO FRIENDS of ELMENDORPH

N recognition of their effort to preserve and utilize a two hundred year old inn, Friends of Elmendorph are hereby honored with one of America the Beautiful Fund's "American Star" Awards of 1997.

- For creating a needed community center on the ground floor of the Inn, going above and beyond the typical scope of a heritage museum;
- For their efforts thus far in raising funds for the second floor phase of the restoration project. This space will soon be home to the headquarters of the Egbert Benson Historical Society of Red Hook and will provide needed storage for historical collections and records of the Red Hook community;
- For integrating the living history at the Inn with the local fourth grade history program, giving the children the opportunity to view how the "common man" of the past lived in the affluent area;
- For keeping their spacious South Room as a meeting space for civic organizations, including the Historical Society and Chamber of Commerce;
- For the valuable meeting space used by local heritage clubs such as the Elmendorph Spinners, Quilters and Northern Dutchess Doll collectors;
- For using the Inn as a center for art, craft and Garden Club shows, and Annual Family Christmas Open House, Snowflake Parade and Tree Lighting;
- For the restoration completed thus far on this 222 year old building using broad-based community support, including central heating, electricity, handicapped accessibility, and the interiors and exteriors of the building;
- For transforming the Elmendorph from a building on the verge of destruction into an essential community center, Friends of Elmendorph has been selected from thousands of projects all across America as a model of community service.

The creative uses of the Inn and the growing community-based support behind the expansion for the restoration project are examples of the spirit that founded this country and of the important role we all can play in keeping that spirit alive to enable this country to truly be, from sea to shining sea, America the Beautiful.

HISTORIC NOTES

UST as the Post Road provided an inland alternative to travel on the Hudson River, a turnpike paralleled the Mohawk River heading west from Albany and Schenectady. The <u>History of Herkimer County, N.Y.</u>, published by F.W. Beers, New York in 1879 provides a description of commerce along that route.

"Before the Erie Canal was made there was a vast amount of travel on the Mohawk turnpike; sometimes as many as twenty stage coaches drove over the road in twenty-four hours, and large wagons drawn by three, four or five horses, were often seen on the road. These wagons were covered with canvas, and heavily loaded with merchandise and groceries if going west, or with potash, alcohol, salt, etc., if going east.

With all this travel the taverns found business, but the Erie Canal and next the railroad, put an end to all this, and the taverns went out one after another, like so many lamps when the oil is exhausted.

Old men used to relate that in their youth they frequently met at these houses on Saturday afternoons to swap and sell old horses. Sometimes one person would make several trades in a few hours. These horse fairs afforded much custom at the bar, and sometimes the jockey would ride (if able) the same horse home that he took there."

This passage reminds us that the first Dutchess and Columbia County Agriculture Fair was held on the grounds of the Elmendorph Inn in 1813, but by 1854 competition from steamboats and railroads had so diminished traffic on the Post Road that the Elmendorph had become a two-family house.
