The Brenzels in Red Hook

IHELM BRENZEL was born in Olberada Kreis, Hesse, Germany on September 27, 1839. He left his parents, ANNA BARBA and JOHAUNSE BRENZEL, to sail to America in 1855 and celebrated his 16th birthday at sea. Americanizing his name to WILLIAM, he worked as a farmer until he enlisted in the Union Army to fight in the Civil War. He was wounded in the Battle of Irish Bend, Louisiana, on April 14, 1863 and was mustered out of Company A, 159th Infantry Regiment New York on October 12, 1865 in Augusta, Georgia. He returned to Livingston and married ANNA ELIZA KEELER on April 19, 1866.

HENRY BRENZEL was the 5th of the 15 children William and Anna raised. He married MARY CATHERINE KILMER, daughter of URIJAH and ALICE FELLER KILMER, on November 3, 1898. Their six children were born in Upper Red Hook. He was a blacksmith by trade. They later moved to 60 West Market Street in Red Hook where he continued the blacksmith business while serving as postmaster and then mayor of the village. Both Henry and Mary were very musical. He played the coronet in a band and she played the organ for church services.

Their oldest, RAYMOND, married GRACE LASHER KNICKERBOCKER on April 12, 1925. He operated Brenzel's Shoe Store in the village and later had a painting and wall papering business. He also worked at Aucock's grocers and at both of his brothers stores. They lived on Old Post Road in Upper Red Hook and had no children.

RALPH operated the Krasdale store, RK Brenzel Meats and Groceries, on South Broadway and retired from the US Postal Service. In retirement, he worked at the Red Hook Farmers Co-op. He married DOROTHY SMITH COON on December 11, 1949. They lived on Route 9 north of the village and had no children.

MILDRED graduated from the Krissler Institute in Poughkeepsie and worked as a secretary for the Chocolate Factory and Central Hudson in Red Hook. She married CLIFFORD DOYLE on May 30, 1926 and worked with him at their business, CR Doyle Confectionery, on West Market Street. They built a house at 33 Prince Street directly behind her parents house and raised SHIRLEY and DENIS there.

ROLAND and ELEANOR LASHER were married on March 1, 1931. They built at 31 Prince Street and had one son, GLENN. Roland managed the Schaffer Stores grocery (which became the Empire Market) on South Broadway and Eleanor worked with him there. He later retired from the Grand Union Company.

MARY worked in a bakery in the village before she married RUSSEL CLUM on April 13, 1930. She moved the farthest from home, 5 miles up Route 9, to his family farm where she assisted him in its operation. They built a house there and had one daughter, IANIS.

MARGUERITE married J. BERTRAM SMITH on June 27, 1943. She worked for CR Doyle Confectionery and after Bert returned from W.W.II, they built and operated Smith Motors on Route 9, south of the village. They had one son, DALE, and lived in a house they built on the garage property.

Through the years, Henry and Mary and their children were active in St. John's Reformed Church in Upper Red Hook. All of the children were baptized there and are buried in the cemetery along with their parents. Some of them were married there. To this day, many of the grandchildren and their children and grandchildren have been married, baptized, and worship at St. John's.

WILLIAM BRENZEL

Wm. Brenzel of Livingston, One of Last Two Survivors, Died Tuesday.

William Brenzel, Livingston's oldest resident, and who, with Joseph A. Way, of this city, was one of the last of the surviving members of R. D. Lathrop Pest, G. A. R., died Tuesday morning at his home in Livingston. This leaves Comrade Way the only one of Lathrop Post, which at one time numbered a couple of hundred members and which surrendered its charter a couple of years ago, when its membership became too small to fill officers' posi-

Mr. Brenzel was 03 years and seven months of age. He was born in Germany and came to this county as a boy of 17 years. He was working on a farm in Livingston when Lincoln's call for volunteers was sounded throughout the nation for the Civil War, and he joined Co. A. 159th New York Regiment of Volunteers, made up of Columbia and Dutchess county young men. In the battle of Irish Bend, in Louisiana, he was wounded and after the battle was picked up on the field, and for three months was in a military hospital. He then rejoined his regiment and continued in service for the rest of the war.

Following his service as a soldier, he returned to Livingston and, apart from

nine years spent at Cohoes and a like period in Gallatin, his long life was passed in Livingston. He bought a farm at Walker's Mills, which he conducted until twenty years ago, when he moved to Livingston Village, and had since been a resident there.

Despite his years in camp and field, with toil of the soil, Mr. Brenzel was robust in his advanced years, but for the past six week he had been confined to his home and under medical treatment.

He was a member of the Hudson Post of the Grand Army of the Republic as long as it existed, and for years he never missed being in line for the annual Memorial Day exercises held bere. He was also a member of Johnstown Grange, of Livingston, and was a faithful attendant and member of the Reformed church of that village.


He married Miss Anna Eliza Keeler, of Gallatin, who died some years ago. There are eleven surviving children of their union: Four sons, John and Davis, of Cohoes; Henry, of Red Hook, and Edgar, of Hudson; seven daughters, Mrs. Leon Goud, of Alamo, Texas; Mrs. Ernest Taylor, of Albany; Mrs. Ernest Goulding, of Cohoes; Mrs. Claude Perlee, of Linlithgo, Mrs. Jas. Plass, of Livingston, and the Misses Mary and Amelia Brenzel, who lived with their father.

Mr. Brenzel was a man of straightforward ways, industrious, a good citizen and kindly neighbor, and he was held in high esteem throughout this vicinity. The Brenzel Family




