

Promises To Seek Christian Unity

VATICAN CITY (U)—Pope Paul VI, in his first message to the world, pledged today to continue the Vatican Ecumenical Council and strive for international peace.

The new Pope, clearly setting out on the path traced by Pope John XXIII, also promised to work for Christian unity and go ahead with the Canon Law revision that John started.

Pope Paul completed the outline of his program with the assurance he would support the policies of social justice outlined by his predecessors.

The prepared message in Latin, less than 24 hours after his election as 262nd supreme pontiff of the world's half-billion Roman Catholics, was in effect a keynote speech.

The pontiff spoke as jubilant Catholics made ready for his inauguration June 30 in Christendom's most brilliant ceremony.

The papal speech was broadcast from the Sistine Chapel where the Sacred College of Cardinals Friday elected Giovanni Battista Montini, 65-year-old archbishop of Milan, as the new Pope.

"The pre-eminent part of our pontificate will be occupied with the continuation of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council, on which the eyes of all men of goodwill are focused," Pope Paul said.

"This will be the principal work, for which we intend to devote all the energies which the Lord gave us so that the Catholic Church... can attract all men to it."

Pope Paul did not say when he would reconvene the Council.

Considerable preparatory work must be done, and this was suspended on Pope John's death June 3.

The 65-year-old Pope had often spoken with views similar to Pope John's.

Pope Paul's keynote speech today left little doubt.

The Pope spoke after each of the cardinals advanced one by one to his papal throne before the altar in the Sistine Chapel. They wore their great capes with long, flowing trains.

Pope Paul wore his white bishop's miter and a gold-embroidered stole. Each cardinal knelt before the Pope and kissed the ring on his right hand.

When 87-year-old Maurilio Cardinal Fossati of Turin advanced, Pope Paul arose from his throne and, smiling, stepped down two steps, to meet the aged cardinal. They embraced on both cheeks in what is called "the kiss of peace."

Vatican officials announced the coronation date of June 30, one day after the feast day of St. Peter and St. Paul. They said the day is most particularly connected with the memory of St. Paul.

A father-to-be will never see his child which was expected in August.

Jack D. Taggart, 21, of 3777 Tacoma Ave., died today at St. Joseph Hospital at 1:27 a.m. He was the victim of a swimming accident.

On June 9, Taggart and some friends were swimming in the Vermilion River. He attempted a dive from a cliff into the river and sustained a neck injury which caused paralysis from the neck down.

An employee of the American Shipbuilding Co., he and his wife, Virginia, were expecting their first child in August. A benefit dance to raise funds for the young couple was planned by the Stylers, a club of which Taggart was a member. It is scheduled for Sunday at 8 p.m. at Hotel Antlers.

Born here, he spent his entire life in this area and was a graduate of Lorain High School. He was employed as an apprentice pipe fitter at the American Shipbuilding Co. and was a member of Church of the Redeemer.

Survivors beside his widow are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Taggart; a sister, Patricia; his grandparents, Mrs. Grace Taggart and Mr. and Mrs. William Reeder Sr., all of Lorain.

Funeral services will be Monday at 1:30 a.m. at Reichlin-Cooley Funeral Home, followed by services at 2 p.m. at Church of the Redeemer. Burial will be in Elmwood Cemetery. Visitation may be made after 7 p.m. today at the funeral home.

The family suggests memorial contributions be made to Church of the Redeemer Building Fund.

Negroes Vow To Stage Mass Show

Negroes vowed to stage mass demonstrations in Gadsden, Ala., today and there was a threat of new protest marches in racially torn Cambridge, Md.

Southern integration leader Martin Luther King Jr. urged Negroes at a rally at Gadsden Friday night to "keep up your campaign" which saw more than 50 demonstrators routed by electric cattle prods Friday.

King cautioned the Negroes against violence. Bernard Lee, one of the civil rights strategists in Gadsden, said Negroes were "inspired" by King's talk and would hold "mass demonstrations in downtown Gadsden" today.

At Cambridge, where National Guardsmen were called to preserve order last week, negotiations to end racial problems hit a snag Friday night and Negro leaders threatened to resume demonstrations.

The Negroes accused state and city officials of negotiating in bad faith. Chief mediator Edmund Mester, an aide to Maryland Gov. J. Millard Tawes, said negotiations would resume today.

The entire 85-member police force at Albany, Ga., was ordered into emergency duty Friday night in hand an expected racial demonstration, but Negroes decided against

Leaders To Meet With JFK

WASHINGTON (U)—President Kennedy brings under one roof today 30 Negro and white civil rights spokesmen, some of them bitter rivals for leadership in the drive to smash racial barriers.

The White House session, bringing together some AFL-CIO officials as well as heads of organizations that have spearheaded demonstrations for Negro equality, will be Kennedy's fourth meeting this week in his effort to quiet and settle the turbulent integration scene.

Among those invited to meet with Kennedy, who leaves tonight on a 10-day trip to Europe, are Dr. Martin Luther King, president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference; Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People; James Farmer, national secretary of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE); Ralph McGill, editor of the Atlanta, Ga., Constitution; and A. Phillip Randolph, president of the AFL-CIO Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters.

This week Wilkins brought into the open the feud among the organizations fighting for civil rights.

Speaking at an NAACP rally, Wilkins sharply criticized CORE, Dr. King's Christian Leadership Conference and the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee.

Contending that other groups "furnish the noise" while the NAACP "pays the bills," Wilkins told the rally "don't go giving them your money when it should be given to us."

What precisely Kennedy wishes to discuss with the civil rights leaders today was not disclosed.

One cause for concern in the administration are the explosive demonstrations — some of which have flared into rioting — in North and South, and government officials have been laboring to keep the lid on.

Within the past three weeks the President himself has conferred with theater owners, operators of retail stores, motels and hotels, labor leaders, churchmen, educators and Friday—lawyers.

For more than an hour Kennedy talked with 244 of the country's leading attorneys — 60 of them from the South — in the White House East Room.

At Kennedy's request, they established a committee to work toward establishing better communications between whites and Negroes.

One lawyer said the thrust of Kennedy's argument was not for his legislative program — to which some of the Southern lawyers objected — but an appeal for the lawyers to work in their hometowns for racial harmony.
