Lorain Girl Missing After Cape Cod Boating Mishap

A Lorain girl who in June completed her third year at Ohio University is missing and presumed drowned today in a boating accident off Cape Cod, Mass.

For Miss Sheryl L. Horne, 21, a summer job in the Cape Cod area ended tragically and brought the second tragedy in a year in the family of Lorain Atty. Clayton E. Horne, 2415 E. Erie Ave.

Sheryl's mother died in August, 1963. Sheryl was at Cape Cod on a vacation trip a year ago when her mother became ill and Sheryl was called home.

Mrs. John Nagle, neighbor of the Hornes on E. Erie Ave., said that Sheryl had a chance to work in Sandusky this summer but elected to take a summer job at Cape Cod.

Horne, well known in Lorain legal and political circles, left for Massachusetts Sunday noon. Latest word this morning was that Sheryl's body had not been recovered.

Sheryl was one of two victims of the Massachusetts mishap near Chatham, the Associated Press reported. Two other persons swam to safety after a rowboat carrying all of

them capsized about half a mile from shore.

The four reportedly had been working at nearby Harwich. They went for an early morning row to escape the heat.

Also missing was John Lombardo, 19, of Cranston, R. I. Carl Reetz, Shrewsbury, Mass., and Polly Blakney, 21, Eldridge, N. J., swam to shore when the boat upset.

Reetz said the four set out after work about 2 a.m. Sunday in an eight-foot pram to

row from Holway St. Beach across the bay to Nauset Beach.

Rough waters forced them to turn back, but the boat swamped and the four were cast into choppy, foggy waters.

Reetz and Lombardo attended the University of Rhode Island and were working on Cape Cod for the summer, living in Harwich Port.

The girls roomed together in a summer cottage here. Miss Blakney is a student at Ohio Wesleyan University.

Reetz described the scene:

"...The waves kept pushing us apart...Lombardo shouted 'I'm drowning. I'm going to die right now.'"

Mrs. Lillian Leimbach, counsellor at Lorain High School, said Sheryl was a bright, friendly girl who got along with her fellow students and was well-liked by every body.

In high school she was in the cappella choir, was marching band and participated in the operettas.

She was working toward an educational degree at Ohio University, Athens, and would have been a member of the 1965 class.

The family also included two sisters, Mrs. Cathryn Jones of Sandusky, Mrs. Elsie McGarry, Avon, and a stepmother.

included in the loot were cameras, clothing, jewelry and watches.

There were more than 100 arrests.

Tensions had lessened a great deal by today, police said, but they continued their patrol, still wearing steel helmets.

Last night, five civilians were treated at hospitals for gunshot wounds. Twelve patrolmen were injured by flying objects.

Also injured were a white television cameraman and several other newsmen.

A score of persons were arrested.

The initial outburst followed protest rallies over the fatal shooting of a Negro boy by a white policeman. The violence left one man shot to death, 132 arrested, and more than 100 injured, including a dozen patrolmen.

The Negro killed Saturday night was identified through

fingerprints as Jay Jenkins, 41, an ex-convict with a record of 10 arrests, police said.

They said he had been standing on the roof of a four-story building hurling bricks.

Throughout the Sabbath, Negro leaders, in speeches and in conferences with police and city officials, had demanded Gilligan's arrest.

The Negro leaders — including James Farmer, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality, and Bayard Rustin, leader of last year's civil rights march on Washington — urged Negroes to say home last night. Both men were booed at a rally when they called for non-violence.

Meanwhile, in the Brownsville slum area of Brooklyn, six persons were shot and a youth was hit by acid as long-standing enmity between Negroes and Puerto Ricans in the area boiled over Saturday night.

Two policemen suffered minor injuries and six persons were arrested on weapons charges.

SANDUSKY (UPI) — William G. Appell, 46, Sandusky, shot his wife to death at the Perkins Township fire station Saturday night, and then fatally shot himself.

Investigators said Mrs. Dorothy Appell, 55, had filed for divorce from her husband.
