Everett Yokome, teamster. This was originally Juan Andrada's home and his main mine was the Silver Bonanza at the mouth of the canyon. He had an arastrae here and used to take the gold flakes after his "run" and made them into round gold balls, pea size on up, called "Chiquaquas". He gave me a marble sized one when I was little. Some one stole it later. I've camped here many times when a kid and later Milo and I did when ever making the trip to Brown and the return trip we made to here, loaded with grub and etc.

The first mill in Millspaugh was built of wood and corrugated iron roof. It had two 1200 pd. stamps and concentrating tables, 3 copper plates for separating, a large ore bin at top of mill and rock crusher, a Fairbanks Morse Steam engine and steam water pumps. A deep well was dug and later a 50' tunnel or drift run from the 50' level, thus assuring a plentiful water supply. Just north of the mill was a well equipped Blacksmith Shop and cupboards for carpenter tools, forge and large bellows, picks and drills, which were sharpened in the stock shed. A large water tank was up oon the hill above the mill. 50 feet in front of the mill to the west was a very large pile of dry yucca wood used for fuel in the fire box under the boiler. I used to fire that boiler when a child and took great pride in keeping the steam up.



An incline mine shaft sunk 90' in early 1890's — where shade is dark.




Looking across Recompence Flat towards Searles (Trona) south. The canyon in front, deep, is Shepherds — the old road from Millspaugh to Ballarat. This view is taken from top of hill east of camp. Slate Range on extreme left, the highest peak to the right above the flat malapie is Argus Peak and Trona is at the foot where the old Searles Borax Lake Co. used to be — this is a very large dry lake. On the far side of the left is where we found the tin deposit and on the other side of this, not in view, is the Golden Gate Claim — but they all fizzled out. So dreams must come to an end.


Dick and Bob in front of our boiler and "stamps" — 2— 1200 pds each. 2 stamp mill after the cowboys and Milo tore the building down in 1916-17 and we hauled the red corrugated iron to Darwin in our Buick and built our big garage building that Silas Reynolds and Milo were partners in. Gas 35 cents a gal in 50 gal drums and hand pump. Business good and Milo busy making cars run! The tall "stack" in front of boys and the flywheel of the engine in back. I "fired" the boiler when a girl — yucca wood, huge pile in front of mill. 1900's mill built 1901, first one of wood which burned down 1902, and second mill of corrugated red iron siding and roof built 1903. Ore bin at top, road grade, from tunnel in back. Tunnel around the grade half mile to tunnel portal.





Al, Dick, Bob and Me. Relocating Mill Site. We sold the stamps, machinery, etc. to a man in Olancha who rebuilt it as a custom mill. Sage brush is taking over our once beautiful camp 1900 to 1913-14. In the early 1940's Junk men were all over, picking every scrap of iron, even old horse shoes. Worked for days to get our boiler out, but still there — couldn't do anything with the rock walls. We had good masons who built it and all the walls in 1900's. I re-located the Mill Site several times to keep others out, before 1941. After that the Base "NOTS" closed off all our part of the country just out of Darwin — Old Coso, Junction, camp (Millspaugh) and is still closed 1977, a bombing range.



Bev Hunter, old friend from 1900 days, came to round up wild horses. We went along to La Motte springs where his trap corrals were down the flat and to the east — fine springs — on into Water Canyon which empties into Panamint Valley and he took his stock out that way and on to Barstow and shipped east. He didn't care whose horses it was — wild, Indians, and 3 of ours — but could not head them off and they went on down Mt. Spring Canyon and on to Mojave where Mrs. Catlin put them in her corral and wrote us they were there, Jerry, Yaqui and one of Indian George's mules.







Stout and Erwin were prospectors and miners, awfully nice fellows, far above the average miner or prospector. They drove into camp one evening, went to work next day and were with us for months, both gold miners too. Stout had a fine camera and took many pictures — had an extra horse tied behind the wagon, a well built sorrel with the awful name of "Pearl". I rode her a lot that summer of 1907. This was shortly after Grandma Marshall died, July 4th, 1907.

Looking south down Shepherd's Canyon, Argus Peak in far distance. The cloudburst in 1905 filled in the back of the store, etc. Grandma Marshall and I were in Camp alone all that summer.





"Yaqui" and "Mustache" were raised on the Newhall Ranch which branded their stock on the left jaw for the year foaled and "Mustache" had "98" on his jaw. "Yaqui" belonged to Andrew Jockius and carried his brand on left hip, "Chenette" wore a 3 on her left hip, the brand of "Bill Johnson", Indian George's oldest son, Mike Hanson's full brother. They took names then of someone they worked for or who gave them a name. "Mustache" was a perfectly broken saddle cow horse — could do anything on him and to shoot off him he would stand like a statue, and if you missed, would look around you in a disgusted way.



Road into Coso Keyes Camp (Dad's) from old Coso Rd. and the one on up the hill was to the mine Dad Mecham and Bill Keyes — former partner of Scotty's — came through here on a prospecting trip in 1908. Bill had these claims, a deal was made and Dad called the property after Keyes. In 1909 camp was set up and shaft sunk. Milo came out to be with his dad and it was the summer of 1909 I first met him at Frank Howard's ranch where I had gone to collect some money and Milo came to get a horse from Frank. He rode home with me to get his mail. I was home for the summer and went back to Los Angeles in September not knowing our "fate was sealed". A year later we started "keeping company". He and Lonnie and Mrs. Lally had good times together and in 1911 Lonnie and Mrs. Lally were married. Lonnie and Margie "stood up" with us when we were married in Independence, July 12th, 1912.

Dad Mecham's Camp

Milo and I lived here after we came back from the Mts. on our honeymoon—stayed from August to November. Dad and Mother Mecham were with us and Lonnie Lee was working, then they went to Oakland and we and Lonnie worked for awhile and Theo Petersen came over to work, but no money came, so we shut down and went over home, Millspaugh.

Cook tent in the center, and Dad and Mother's tent to the left.
Later we put ours up; floor and walled up under the big yucca tree under the arrow. This is looking north and road out to old Coso road goes up and over the flat hill in right center.

This was the shaft just above camp. Milo ran the hoist (gas engine) and Lonnie sent up the buckets. Not much paying ore so the folks left for Oakland in September and Milo and I closed camp down in November, 1910, no "dinero" coming through.


Went over to Millspaugh and stayed with Mama and then we three drove to Los Angeles and Milo and I went by boat to Oakland, 1910, in time to have a grand family Christmas dinner with all the Mecham's except Jessie and her son, Richard, who couldn't make it from Washington.

This is looking south. One noon Mother Mecham was taking Milo's lunch up to him and in front of her a rattle snake was coiled. She yelled and turned back and there was another crossing the road — then she really did yell! But Milo couldn't hear with the engine running — I did and rushed up to "rescue" her. That did it — she wanted to go back to civilization!

About 2 miles right in back of the gallies frame is Sand Canyon and the Indian Writings.

Flat rock with Bench Mark, 6,157 ft. altitude just below well in lower center of picture. Madeleine Lally, 6 yrs old, by the well, with teamster Yokcum.

Boarding house at right on hill. In front, a miner, "Mona" (dog), Jessie N. Fowzer, Al Millspaugh, Chauncey Lally, 8 yrs old (between Al and his mother). And Mrs. Margie Lally.

Store and assay office by big cactus wood pile.

In center, second mill, with two 1200 pd stamps, concentrating tables; first mill of bat and boards burned down April, 1902. Second mill with cyanide plant added built with red corrugated iron. Stamps and block (battery block) were not damaged in fire and used again in 2nd mill.

Lonnie Lee and miner by tents.

Grade from summit on left above tent. Road at right corner of corral down Shepherds Canyon — sharp pitch just below corral and joins old original road from summit down sharply into canyon; goes to Ballarat.







Jacks were prospectors best friends and many a mine was found when hunting for them!
