HISTORY OF MACEDONIA SCHOOL

Macedonia High school is the only high school in the eastern section of Berkeley County. It is located 10 miles from Moncks Corner, 4 miles from Bonneau and 9 miles from Bethera. Pupils travel 24 miles from Honey Hill which is the most distant point.

A number of years ago Mrs. Annie Huxford taught a few pupils in Macedonia Christian Church. From this our school got its name. Next a log building was used for several years, then a two room wooden structure was built.

In 1923 Macedonia, Unlion, and Addison schools consolidated to form Macedonia Grammar School. A four class room wooden building was constructed which cost about seven thousand dollars. Mr. Issac Porcher, a man who was most interested in education at that time, helped secure the money for the building. Mr. Odum was superintendent of this five teacher school. The following act was passed by the general assembly on the 14th day of March 1929:

No. 344

An Act to Create a certified High School District in Berkeley County, to be known as Macedonia High School District, to Designate the Trustees thereof and to make other Provisions in Relation Thereto.

Assembly of the State of South Carolina: That School District No. 4 in Berkeley County, to wit, known as the Macedonia School District is hereby declared to be a High School District and shall be known as the Macedonia High School District. The said High School District is hereby declared to be a body corporate and as such is authorized to use a seal, to sue and be sued, to issue notes, bonds or other certificates of indebtedness, and in all respects to enjoy the same rights, privileges and benefits, and exercise the same rights of this State. For school purposes the Board of Trusteds are authorized to use the present Macedonia School building.

Section 2: The following persons are named as the Board of Trustees of the said Macedonia High School District, to wit: Ernest E. Wyndham,

Chairman, Stiles Wyndham, John Caddell, Ben Guerry and Robert Pipkin. They shall hold office for a period of two years from the approval of this Act and until their successors are appointed and qualified, such appointment to be made by the County Board of Education subject to the approval of a majority of the Delegation to the General Assembly.

Section 3. Said Board of Trustees of said High School District as thus consituted shall have charge of all matters appertaining to conduct and management of High School.

Section 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval by the Governor.

Approved the 14th day of March, A.D. 1929.

For the school session of 1929-30 there were 5 grammar school teachers and two high school teachers. Mr. C. E. DuPont was superintendent at this time and worked diligently for education.

In the year of 1930-31 the school showed much progress. The enrollment increased rapidly and new teachers were added. In 1933, Mr. DuPont died. Mr. Joe Brown, who at that time was principal of the grammar school filled his unexpired term as Superintendent and served in this capacity for three years.

During this time, four new class rooms were added and a new, brick auditorium large enough to seat approximately seven hundred people was constructed. The commercial course was introduced by Mr. Brown.

For the year '36-'37, Mr. S. C. Morris acted as superintendent. In September, 1937, Mr. Henry A. White of Andrews became Superintendent with a corpse of fourteen teachers. Many changes were made and modern educational methods were instituted. Examination were abolished and units of work introduced. Supervised study and play ground activities were started; the grading system was simplified; a newspaper, "The Macedonia Pointer", and an annual, "The Pioneer", were published; clubs were stressed and Macedonia entered fully into State and District Contests. June 1938 closed one of the most profitable and successful school terms in the history of the school. However, a few days after school closed a great calamity befell the community for the school building, all equipment and auditorium burned.

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The session of '38-'39 was taught in stalls built from the garages and the cottage rooms. The trustees, Mr. D. E. McNair, Mr. Styles Wyndham, Mr. Sam Caddell, Mr. Sam Wiggins and Mr. Lawrence Wilson worked diligently to keep the school going and to get a new building.

In October 1938, a \$75,000 brick school house and and auditorium and gymnasium combined was started with the help of the W.P.A. This school building was used most of the term of '39-'40, although incomplete. Music Home-economics, agriculture and Shop were added to the curriculum and splendid work done in each department. Many educational trips were made, of which the two most outstanding were the trip to Columbia and to Washinton by the Seniors. Two radio broaccests were given, one by the F.F.A. and the other by the Glee Club. Seventeen Seniors will receive diplomas on May 23, the largest class to graduate in the history of Macedonia. More cups and honors were won this term. Everyone feels that the 1939-'40 school term has been the most successful year ever experience.

Mr. White was born in Andrews, S. C. in 1910. As a little boy of six years, he began his educational career in Andrews where he attended grammar and high school, graduating in the year 1927 with high honors. Then he entered the University of S. C. where he studied hard for four years. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree on June 1931 and will receive his Masser's degree in 1940.

Mr. White began work as a teacher at Pleasant Hill in Georgetown County where he taught for six years and was much loved. In the year 1937-38 he accepted the position as Superintendent of Macedonia High School. He has worked here for the last three years.

The school has progressed very much with Mr. White as Superintendent. We now have a fine brick building instead of an old wooden structure, our curriculum has been improved to meet the needs of country children school music, agriculture and Home Economics department have been added, and a more sensible system of grading introduced; examinations have been abolished; extra-curricula activities have been pushed so that our pupils rate well in declamation, expression and debating. A real library with the best of books has been established. Many trips are enjoyed each year by pupils of all grades. In every way education has been advanced by Superintendent Henry A. White, one of the most loved superintendents of this county or state. You must meet him, for the only definition we can give is "Our Superintendent."
