MEMBERS GTT1ED. 11 TH HERALD 1932

The meeting was called to order by President Carl C. Francisen; other League Officers present were: - Recording Secretary Elizabeth Christensen Treasurer Joseph Sommer, Financial Secretary Ben Johnson, and Editor C. Arne, MarshallhArmand Thomsens. All of Chicago, Illinois.

The meeting opened with an explanation from the President on the question of the call. He explained, that so far no place had been set for our annual Summer Picnic and that since Rockford had better facilities for such an event that most other places in this territory, Rockford ought to take it again. It was understood that time was short, but the Rockford delegation agreed one hundred percent that they should hold the picnic in Rockford, if possible. It will be noted in the list of delegates present that Vega Dance Group was not represented, but the writer has since found out that Vega had the date confused and thought the meeting was to be held the 28th of April, hence their delegates, which had been appointed, were not present.

A discussion on probable reasons why it was hard to get various affiliated organizations to hold the annual summer picnic drew various remarks, but the most outstanding reason was that since all profits from the picnic went to the League, the club sponsoring the picnic felt like it was working for nothing; therefore, if the sponsoring club could get 50% of the profit, there would be more enthusiasm for originating a first class picnic. In view thereof, this division of the profits were agreed upon, and will be the rule in the future. Since all the Chicago delegates had participated in a doing at the Danish Brotherhood Club in Kenosha, Wisconsin, the night before, they were all anxious to return home as soon as possible, and since the business before us was completed for the time being, our Chicago friends left for home.

Since that meeting, we have been busy in Rockford getting our groups together and getting their approval on holding the picnic. This has been accomplished, but we are having trouble getting a proper park at a proper date. We have tried to get Svithiod Park, our very best, but this park is taken until way out in September, so that one is out. We may get Hillcrest where we had the picnic last year, but we are not certain. If we do, it will be about the middle of August. This is all I can report at this time, but rest assured we will have a picnic even if we have to make the picnic grounds ourselves. More reports later.

Look on the chart for the HERALD on the preceding page and notice that the main item in this issue is a list of the reporters.

We have knowingly neglected to mail these receipts to their owners, not because we are lazy or careless, but because we want to do things in an effective manner. We want to run this business with a system to it, as follows:

We want to have subscriptions for 1941(may there be many) paid to us at the convention in 1940; then we will, right there, make out all receipts. In this manner we can check up on reporters' addresses, and contact the people with whom we are going to work through the following year.

So all the receipts for 1940 we still have we will hand out at the convention this fall, with a lot of shiny, new ones - we hope.

Now, most often whn the HERALD mentions any persons by name it means that such persons will be expected to do some work for the League. Yes, actually lay aside other hobbies for a while, and spend some of your own dear, precious spare time on keeping the League going. For the thing won't go by itself, you know; it must be pulled. The family car runs on gas, but the League runs on work. And what is the reporters share of this work?

The perfect reporter sends in a news letter to the HERALD four times per year, around the 20 of January, April, July, and October. He brings around and pays at the convention the subscription fee from his own folk dance club.

He distributes the Herald among the club members.
He has one copy of the HERALD filed permanently with the club.
He keeps a complete set of the HERALDS at hand for his own reference

This is an awful lot of work to think about, isn't it. But who said you had to think about it! - - No, just go ahead and do it, and it isn't so much trouble after all, you'll see.

Some reporters have been doing all this right along, Thanks-Thanks others write only once in a while, O.K.-C.K.; and one or two of them haven't given a peep for more than a year, shame-shame!

When the news letters come in, the two editors can trim up the works and bat out a set of stencils for a complete issue all in one evening; and then the HERALD would be out on time. But when news is scarce the editor must scratch around for several evenings in order to get a self-respecting newspaper together. And on top of that it must all be printed, and then mailed.

Club members, if there is no mention of your club in this issue, it will do no good to shoot the editors; remember that it depends just as much on the reporters whether we shall be liars or not, when we say:
