My dear brother:-

Why don't you write more after Joe? I know you are busy but can't you take at least a few minutes and drop me a line. I don't have any more time than you and I manage to ~~get~~ write from three to four and sometimes five letters a week, home, besides many others. I will be gone by Sunday and after that you won't need to write so often, but I wanted, while I was in this country, to

hear from home as often as possible.
You don't know how cheerful a
letter from home makes me feel.

How do you like my paper?
Some class hey? I hope I get
those pictures before I leave. I
am enclosing some films, have
them printed and put in away
for me.

Say Joe, remember this. You
know it is Gracie's birthday Jan. 1.
I want you to buy her them as
many American beauties as she is
old. I am telling you this, because
I may not be able to tell you after
ward.

I never did receive those books
and that album I asked for. It is
too late now so never mind. I feel
like kicking tonight.

I feel fine though. I hope I will
be so well in Frava. I will write as
often as I can.

Joe, be good, serve God and do all
you can to win others for him. It
may be a few years before I see you
again and when I come home I expect
to see you working hard in church. Get
me. Keep out of the service, leave it alone.
Are of us ^{is} enough. I will send home \$15-
tomorrow, get something and give to
mother for her birthday. I won't
be able to buy any more now.
