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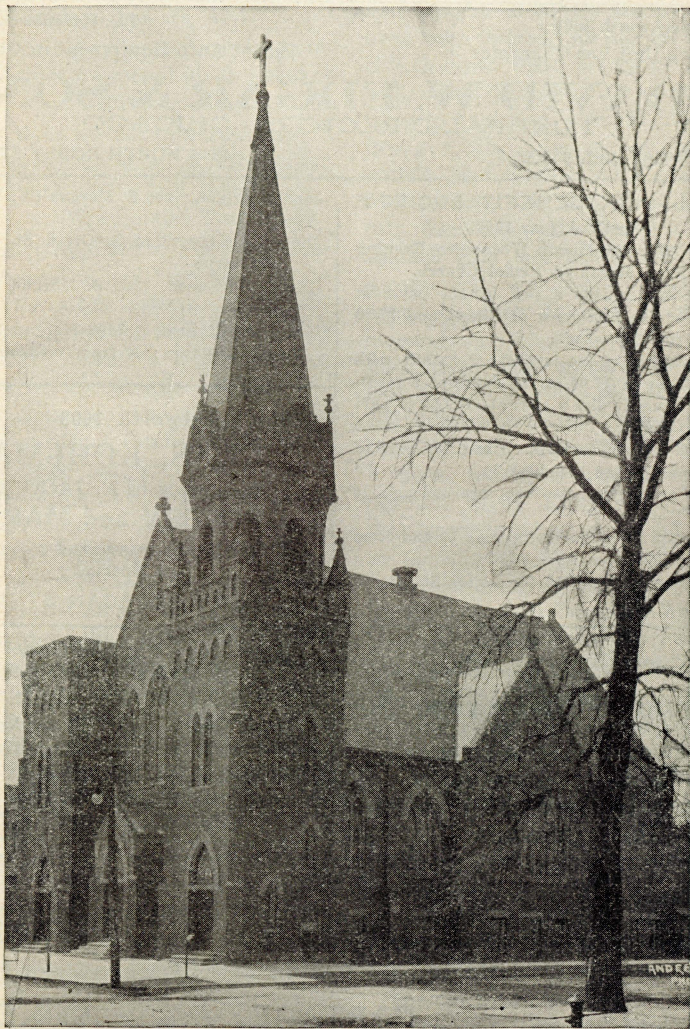

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ANNUAL REPORT.

Submitted to the Bethel Church,
Thursday, Jan. 21, 1932.

"And when they were come to Jeru-
salem...they rehearsed all things that
God had done with them." Acts 15. 4

"Upon their arrival in Jerusalem...
they reported in detail all that God,
working with them, had done."

Weymouth's Translation.

The great Apostle Paul and his com-
panion Barnabas had been sent by the
Church of Antioch to Jerusalem to sub-
mit to the Church of Jerusalem where
the "elders" resided a report of their
activities in the Gentile world. The
Book of Acts narrates how the whole
assembly in silence listened to the state-
ment of these two great missionaries
who had by the power of the indwell-
ing spirit been such instruments in
God's hands to spread the Good News.

Since that rehearsal of events, that
detailed report of "all that God, work-
ing with them, had done" the Church
of Christ has continued its onward
progress down through the centuries.
Our modern church life may lack the
dramatic touch of the Jerusalem meet-
ing but the indwelling spirit of Christ
has not been withdrawn from the
Church which we love and labor for.
And our Bethel Church constitutes no
exception. Tonight we meet to report
in detail "all that God, working with
human agencies, has done."

The Church services which have been
conducted each Sunday during the past
year have been conducive to much spir-
itual good. One could not report in de-
tail all that God has done in His Word
and Sacraments. Statistics fail to ade-
quately portray just to what extent in-
spiration, comfort, guidance and help

have been experienced. All this is hid-
den from our fallible, human judgment
and insight. But the English services
have been indeed well attended and the
church upon these occasions has been
well filled. The Swedish services con-
tinue to hold their own and are held the
first and third Sunday mornings in the
month. The English, the second and
fourth, and the fifth whenever the
fifth Sunday occurs. Evening services:
English first and third, and Swedish,
second and fourth, and a fifth when-
ever the fifth Sunday occurs. Our
evening services have been well worth
the while. During the year we have
had special evening services and our
fall attendances have been very fine.
However, attendances do not necessari-
ly mean increased spiritual fervor and
devotion to the Kingdom. But we feel
that larger numbers have been reached
by the ministry of the Word.

Our ushers have rendered good serv-
ice the past year. Adolph Wahlen has
been the chairman of the ushers.

A line or two might suffice regard-
ing habitual absentees. The Board of
Administration has placed on the in-
active list a considerable number which
has neglected the attendance upon
divine worship. A member is not placed
on this list because of inability to meet
the financial obligations; but because
of lack of interest. For as we have so
often stated: where church interest,
devotion and love is lacking, there is
lacking the sacrificing spirit.

The prayer meetings continue to give
the pastor a distinct spiritual en-
couragement. There is a group in
Bethel that loves these informal meet-
ings. Holy Week was observed as well
as Universal Prayer Week; the in-
terest evinced is on the increase.

The Lord's Supper is a holy ordinance and our Bethel members have, as a rule, observed this ordinance by a participation thereof. Six Swedish and six English communion services have been held during the year. On special occasions such as the first communion, the Anniversary Sunday, etc., there have been large numbers who have knelt down at the altar and received the blessed presence of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. From indications it would appear that a revival has been experienced in this respect. It is with a feeling of thanksgiving that we can report tonight that our young folks are realizing the special blessing to be derived in the Lord's Supper. A few never come to the sacred feast; and the reason is obvious: worldliness, lack of church interest, and to them can be applied the expression: they have lost their love for Christ.

Our Church School functions as of yore. We wish we could in detail report all that God, working with the faithful, splendid teachers, has done in the lives of our boys and girls. Our three departments are now well organized and we feel that a word of grateful "God bless you" should be given each and every officer and teacher. Our Cradle Roll has likewise performed a distinct service to the church.

We are thankful for this branch of our church life. Vacation Church School was held last August. Student Frank Carlson, assisted by Margaret Johnson, conducted the school. An enrollment of 53 was realized. While the enrollment was not as large as last year, yet much good was accomplished. The pastor also had August off and the student pastor filled the pulpit to the satisfaction as well as pleasure of our members.

Our Church Organizations have been a positive aid to Bethel this past year. One could also here give a detailed report concerning the extent of the activities. Some of the officers will submit those at this meeting. Dorcas, as usual, has been Martha-like as well as Mary-like at the meetings. Devotions have been held, and the society has defrayed the expense connected with the carpeting of the church auditorium and chancel and adjoining rooms. The church is thus made more beautiful than ever before. Besides they have helped considerably with contributions to the treasury of the congregation. The Luther League has likewise enjoyed a year of progressive progress. Our Brotherhood has been divided into four departments. In December one of the departments sponsored evangelistic services in Bethel. Dr. S. J. Sebelius and Rev. Maynard Force were the gospel team. Our Missionary Society has fulfilled its assigned quotas and thus labors for the extension of the Kingdom. The Bethel Circle and the Junior Luther League societies have contributed their share. And the Nursery Society continues to support "the least of these," the children. Our Camp Fire and Boy Scout organizations are a positive means of character-building and in December the District Camp Fire Council met in Bethel when an inspiring service was conducted. The Boy Scout Troop likewise conducted a program at an evening service. "Den Svenska Ungdomsföreningen" passes

into its third year of organization. Splendid programs have been given and the society has had charge of several evening services. In passing the Luther League has had charge of some evening services and each service found the church filled.

The organizations have a definite function in building up the life of Christian fellowship in the congregation, and in helping to contribute to the church finances.

Our Choir has given loyal service to the congregation and our efficient organist, Ralph Peterson, has given several Song Services during the past year. Palm Sunday evening's Cantata and the Christmas and Easter music and special organ program were much appreciated by the members.

Our Church Boards have met each month. The trustees and the deacons have performed the duties of their offices in a spirit of loyalty and coöperation. The chairman of the Board of Trustees will give a report of the financial standing of the congregation. The year has been a difficult one for many of our members in view of unemployment but we look forward with hope to "better times." Despite the "hard times" Bethel has under the conditions done exceedingly well. Because of the lack of finances the office of secretary was discontinued. We thank Miss Anna Burgeson for faithful service.

Our Bethel Emergency Relief Committee has functioned in the good Samaritan spirit. This past year the Relief Fund, counting our organizations, has dispensed funds approximating \$500.

A word or two might be said concerning the Bethel Sick Benefit Society. It is a fine organization and deserves the consideration of many members who have not joined the same.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BETHEL LUTHERAN CHURCH

held Thursday evening December 3, 1931, at 8:30 P. M. after a short devotional meeting had been conducted.

The Chairman Rev. C. Emil Bergquist, opened the meeting with prayer.

The first order of business was that of electing a recording secretary for the year 1932. Mr. John Westberg was unanimously re-elected secretary.

The minutes of the adjourned meeting held January 29th, 1931, were read and approved.

Election of deacons for three years to fill vacancy of the outgoing deacons, Messrs. Roy Johnson, Carl Johnson and

R. T. Sandin, was held. The tellers, appointed by the chairman, Stanley Johnson, Chas V. Johnson, Fred Johnson, Ernest Swanson and Granger Westberg, reported the outcome. Mr. Carl F. Johnson and R. T. Sandin were reelected and Mr. Ernest Bratlie was elected for the years 1932, 1933 and 1934.

Mr. Fred Johnson was elected auditor for three years, 1932, 1933 and 1934, to fill vacancy made by Mr. Roy Johnson whose term expired December 31, 1931.

The trustees elected for a term of three years, 1932, 1933 and 1934 were Mr. Hugo Johnson and Lawrence Larson who were reelected, and Mr. Carl H. Johnson.

Mr. P. J. Marker was elected delegate to attend the Annual Southern Chicago District meeting to be held in St. Matthews church. Mr. C. Knutson was elected alternate.

Mr. John Westberg was elected delegate to the Illinois Conference, and Mr. Claus Johnson was elected alternate.

A motion was duly made, seconded and carried that all officers of our various church organizations must be members of our church.

On a motion duly made, seconded and carried it was decided to give the Board of Deacons power to act relative to matters pertaining to our church Summer School.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the salary of our choir leader and organist, Mr. Ralph Peterson, was to remain the same as it is now for the year 1932 with no changes to allowance made for special service and summer vacation.

A unanimous vote of thanks was extended to Miss Svea Broman organist at our Thursday evening services for the fine service she has rendered.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, it was decided that our next meeting, the report meeting, be held

the third Thursday evening in January.

At this juncture Rev. Bergquist left the meeting, having appointed Mr. John Westberg to act as chairman during his absence while action was taken on the salary of the pastor for the year 1932.

On a motion duly made and unanimously carried, it was decided that the pastor's salary remain the same as it is now.

A motion was duly made, seconded and carried that our church continue paying for the electric light and gas bills the same as decided at the January, 1931 meeting.

After this juncture Rev. Bergquist again resumed the duties of chairman for the rest of this meeting.

On Reverend Bergquist's return to the meeting, a rising vote of appreciation was given for his untiring Christian service and fellowship extended in Bethel and for all our members and friends. Our acting chairman, Mr. John Westberg, further wished him on behalf of the Bethel members, the blessings of God and further that the Bethel members wanted Mrs. Bergquist and him to feel that the congregation is for them and stand ready to assist them in their work here in Bethel for the Kingdom of God.

Rev. Bergquist thanked the congregation in behalf of Mrs. Bergquist and himself for the expressions extended to him and pointed out to the members his position in our church work. He stated that he was not here for the financial earnings that he might acquire but that he was here as God's servant to help in the upbuilding of the Kingdom of God.

In view of the financial situation of the church treasury at this time, Rev. Bergquist volunteered to present to the church a month's salary next year, 1932.

A resolution was read coming from the 1932 Budget Committee to the effect that the Sexton's salary be cut to \$65.00 per month; and further that

a sum not to exceed \$100.00 be spent for thorough cleaning of the church three times a year.

On a motion duly made, seconded and carried, the trustees were given power to act on this matter, and further that the resolution from the Budget Committee be forwarded to the trustees.

On a motion duly made, seconded and carried, the date for the installation of the newly elected deacons and trustees be left to the Pastor to decide.

Mr. Gunnar Sandin was elected head usher for our church for the year 1932.

The trustees presented to the congregation a request that they be authorized to make a loan not to exceed \$2,500.00, if found necessary, in the year 1932 to meet the obligations that must be paid. On a motion duly made, seconded and carried, this request was granted.

A motion was made and carried that a questionnaire be sent out to all members in order to determine the consensus of opinion regarding the language used in our church services.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned with prayer by Rev. Bergquist.

The minutes of the regular annual meeting held December 3, 1931 were read and approved. The pastor's report was read by himself, and upon a motion duly made and seconded, was accepted and ordered spread upon the official records of the congregation.

The annual report of the trustees was read by the chairman, Mr. Hjalmar Ahlberg and upon a motion duly made and seconded, was accepted and

made a part of these minutes. (Report printed in full elsewhere).

The Financial Secretary's report, presented by Mr. Melvin Olson, and the Treasurer's report, submitted by Mr. L. C. Larson, were both duly accepted and ordered spread upon the minutes. Both of these reports had been previously audited and found correct by the auditing committee.

The reports of the various organizations were presented and read at this meeting. They were accepted and ordered spread upon the official record of the congregation.

A committee of three, Mrs. Gust Larson, Mrs. F. T. Westberg and Mr. Gus. Johnson, was appointed to arrange a place at the Augustana Home for the Aged for our janitor Mr. Walgren who will retire from his present position as soon as the members of the Board have selected a successor for his place.

A motion was carried that a rising vote of thanks be extended to Mr. Charles Tronerud for his generous donations to the church.

A flower committee consisting of Mrs. Gust Larson and Mrs. F. T. Westberg was appointed to arrange for flowers on the altar for the Sunday Worship Services. This committee makes it possible for the members of the church to furnish flowers in memory of some loved one or anniversary occasion or birthday to be thus observed.

THE CRADLE ROLL.

In the last Synodical Minutes we read under statistics: Baptized during the year 1930, 9,189, of whom 4,478 were children of parents who are members of some Augustana church, and 4,711, or more than one-half of all children baptized within our Synod, children of non-members. Dr. C. A. Lund in his book, "The Cradle Roll Manual," writes, "The Cradle Roll Department is a connecting link between the church and the home. Through baptism the child becomes a child of God and a member of the church, and hence it devolves upon the home and the church to see to it that the child be brought up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." In cases where the parents are neglectful of their duties, the responsibilities of the church becomes that much greater. In many of the unchurched homes there is practically no connection between the family and the church during the first four or five years of the child's life, or until the child is old enough to enter Sunday school, if the parents then decide that Sunday school is a necessary thing, which is not always the case. This is where the Cradle Roll Dept. can be a valuable aid in establishing a contact with the parents, and this can truly be classed as inner or home mission work. A visit to the home by a worker when the child is enrolled, a pretty card or birthdays, an invitation at Easter and Christmas to the children's festival for both parents and children, also visits in case of sickness or death, all these things help to make the father and mother realize that the church is vitally interested in their little one. In our Bethel Church we have approximately

125 children on our Cradle Roll. Not all the children so enrolled enter our Primary Dept., but we feel assured that the time and attention given to these members of our church will not have been in vain, and that the parents will, when the time comes, enter them in some Lutheran Sunday school.

Pastoral Paragraphs.

(Continued from January issue)

The Christmas "Church Rush" is over. The largest audience that the pastor has ever preached to greeted him at the "julotta." The church was beautifully decorated; choir and soloists contributed with stirring Christmas music;

and the pastor preached to an attentive gathering of listeners, and let us hope, worshipers. But after Christmas—what? An old seasoned pastor in speaking of "julottan" used the term "julkristna", for some do not return until next "julotta." Somehow or ever when the "rush" is over the average pastor breathes easier and more naturally. The normal church life and normal, faithful churchgoers make for a constructive, satisfying growth. Real churchgoers are not built along the lines of "julkristna." Christian life is not a spasmodic, seasonal mood. It's more than "holiday Christianity." The "faithfuls" are "the salt of the earth" and the "light of the world." They make church life possible.

But we have been encouraged because of the increasing number of worshipers at our morning services. The Word of God has not returned void. The Word of God makes the church a church; and "habitual absentees" seemingly forget the fostering influence of the gospel. God send to them a "hunger and thirst" after the ousness of Christ!

Which puts us in a reminiscent mood. Our Church School Christmas Festival, as far as numbers were concerned, was like the "julotta." The program rendered was a unique one and the pageants kept the interest of all the folks. But what did the pastor think as he watched the crowded, spacious

church? He began to ruminate: the fathers and mothers came out loyally and their faces shone with pleasure and pride, as they watched their own boys or girls take part in the beautiful program. But after the holidays—what? Maybe next Christmas will find them sitting expectantly in the pew. Maybe not! The Church School is oftentimes the slender thread of Christian influence that holds many a family group together. But the church itself seems to be in the background of their lives. Are we pessimistic? Hardly! But facts are facts and what we did think was this: just think if our own members were actually interested, vitally concerned about evangelism: what an opportunity to win unchurched fathers and mothers. "The harvest is plenteous; laborers are few." Listen: "Pray ye the Lord of the harvest that he may send laborers into his harvest." How are we to get laborers? By "prayer." And the pastor does breathe this petition: "Lord, send laborers, workers, men and women who have the vision of the Kingdom."

The first week-end of December was an eventful one for Bethel. Dr. S. J. Sebelius and Rev. Maynard Force, "The Gospel Team" from Rock Island, Ill., held a series of evangelistic meetings and the Spirit of the Christ hovered over these services. Neither is an "itinerant evangelist." One is a well-known professor at our

own seminary; the other is a busy city pastor in Moline. Their gospel appeals were heart-searching; and their brief three-day stay in our midst will linger with us as a fragrant benediction. Their method? Un-Lutheran? To go to the altar and renew the covenant of confirmation, to be on one's knees in full public view—to sing old familiar hymns, does seem peculiar to be sure—but had you seen the light in the eyes of those who knelt you too would have said: "Mine eyes have seen the glory of the Lord."

God bless these men in their unselfish, beautiful, sacrificing service to God.

Religion an Aid to Patients.

Religion is a human and vital factor in the practice of medicine, Dr. Charles W. Mayo, world-famed surgeon of Rochester, Minnesota, asserted before the surgery section of the British Medical Association, which met recently in Winnipeg, Canada.

"When a man is about to go on the table in an operating room, if he wishes a visit from a minister in whom he has faith," he said, "it gives him confidence which no science can furnish." Dr. Mayo stated that both patient and surgeon share the benefits of anything tending to aid one in facing a crisis in illness.

This is not news for Christians who

have learned by experience. We have seen the evidences of this in almost innumerable cases in our experiences in hospital work. There is nothing to even approach the blessed peace and submission which the message of God's love in Christ Jesus gives to the believing heart. And the resultant courage is of inestimable value in great troubles of our lives, as in serious illness or when facing an operation. But it is encouraging to have such an eminent specialist like Dr. Mayo make such a statement in the presence of prominent medical men and to have his observation reported in newspapers of several nations.

TRUSTEES REPORT FOR 1931.

The year of 1931 has been full of financial difficulties for all of us. Our congregation, likewise, has also felt the pinch of economic conditions. Our total income for the year of 1931 was \$4,144.97 less than for the year of 1929 and \$2,277.57 less than for the year of 1930.

As a matter of information we tabulate below a comparative statement of receipts and disbursements for the years of 1929, 1930 and 1931.

From the above it will be noted that there has been a decrease of \$1,675.65 in the income derived from dues as compared with 1929 and a decrease of \$474.50 as compared with 1930. The income from Societies, it will be noted, decreased

\$1,500.00 as compared with the year of 1930 and \$746.50 as compared with the year of 1929. However, our disbursements have not been reduced in accordance with the income, but inasmuch as many of our obligations are fixed obligations over which we have no control, it is practically impossible to maintain a balanced budget, especially when all of our income is on an entirely voluntary basis.

In order to meet obligations during the summer months, your Board of Trustees were obliged to make a loan of \$900.00. This money was borrowed from the members of our Board of Administration.

At the close of the year of 1931 we are obliged to report the following unpaid obligations:

Inasmuch as \$1,800.00 of this deficit existed at the close of the year of 1930, the entire deficit of \$2,588.59 cannot be chargeable to the year of 1931.

With reference to improvements made to the church property during the year of 1931, we have the following report to make:

A new wooden floor was laid over the top of the old floor in the church parlors. The only expense to the congregation in the relaying of this floor was that for materials, all of the labor having been donated by a group of men of our congregation.

New carpets were laid in the church auditorium, which has greatly added to the beauty of our church. The entire cost of this expense was borne by our Dorcas Society. We desire to express to the Dorcas Society our sincere appreciation for this timely improvement to our church.

The necessary cleaning and decorating was done in the parsonage to keep the building in good repair and appearance.

In conclusion your Board of Trustees desire to call your particular attention to the deficit of \$2,588.89 which has been created during the past two years. It is very evident from the response of our membership during our every-member canvass for 1932 contributions, that this deficit will be considerably increased by the end of 1932. Therefore our congregation must give serious thought to the matter of how this deficit may be wiped out.
