They started with four couples and now have 20 to 24 Folkdancers. As soon as couples arrive at meetings, they start in dancing. They meet every other week on Monday evenings and they serve coffee and rolls and charge a small amount. They also change partners to get accustomed to the dances. They have done this for eight years.

Pete Jacobsen said that Kenosha will try to help out with a few dances, and also mentioned that the Chicago clubs getting together is a very good idea and we will be further advanced in our dancing, in the probability that we can all take a trip to the Scandinavian Countries when time permits.

Peter Olsen also told us about Folkdancing Magazine that is published in Brooklyn, N.Y. This magazine is published once a month and the cost is \$1.25 a year.
