Dear friend be:-

How are you all. I certainly  
cant kick. Feel fine both in  
health and spirits. Today is  
Sunday. I had Sunday school  
all by myself, my clothes not  
being dry enough to wear to the  
Y.M.C.A. having washed them  
last night after supper. The  
nights are a little damp and  
nothing dries over night. I certainly  
enjoy reading that Bible especially  
tonight tho I am going to  
the "Y" to hear Mr. Weigh from  
Chicago speak and sing. You have  
no doubt heard of him.

I started school last Monday.  
Two hours of General O.M. work.  
Two hours of Technical work  
and four hours in the machine

shops.

In this shop we have a small shop mounted on a Froy trailer. A small lathe, vertical mill, arbor press and bench. The machines on this trailer are motor drive, the current being obtained from a generator driven by a gasoline engine which is also mounted on the trailer. All four sides can be let down forming a platform around it. These shops are in use in France with the motor truck companies.

There are only twenty quarters in my room now. A lot of the men were transferred into overseas companies after finishing their course of instruction.

I hear that Al has left for Virginia. If you get his address would you mind sending it to me? And that of Herb Gustafson? I have Herb's Canadian address but he wrote and told me not to write to that address as he was



about to be transferred.

The weather is great now.  
Moderately hot in the day and  
cool at night. A heavy dew  
usually falls in the morning.

How's work? Are you very busy?  
Don't forget me when you pray for  
divine help now more  
than ever before. Remember you  
in my prayers.
